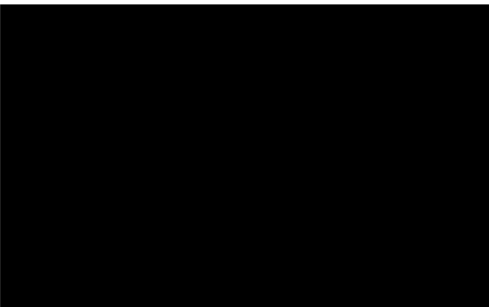

1. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION		
1.1. Mrs Katherine Wiles thanked everyone for taking the time to meet and to discuss the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) required for the extension of Mossdustria.		
1.2. Mrs Wiles discussed the outline/agenda of the meeting and thereafter introduced herself as the Senior Environmental Assessment Practitioner (EAP) and Ms Carmen Krishandutt as the Environmental Assistant EAP. Mrs Wiles also indicated that for the purpose of this application, the applicant and landowner is the Mossel Bay Local Municipality (MBM) and the competent authority is the Western Cape Department of Environmental Affairs and Development Planning (WCDEADP).

1.3. Mr Warren Manuel introduced himself as the Environmental Officer and Ms Gwynnefer Harding introduced herself as the Manager of Economic Development within the Mossel Bay Municipality (MBM). Mr Francois Naude and Mr Danie Swanepoel introduced themselves as the competent authority representing the Western Cape Department of Environmental Affairs and Development Planning (WCDEADP) for the Garden Route District. 2. PURPOSE OF THE MEETING 2.1. Mrs Wiles briefly explained that the purpose of the meeting was to confirm the relevant listed activities, confirm the need for certain specialist studies, discuss the accepted process and proposed timeframes, and outline the level of public participation required according to the latest COVID-19 regulations and associated WC DEADP circular. 3. PROJECT DESCRIPTION 3.1. Mrs Wiles explained that Mossdustria is an industrial area located in close proximity to the Petroleum Oil & Gas Corporation of South Africa (PetroSA) refinery located within the MBM. She further explained that the project entails the extension of Mossdustria and a raceway on two identified properties, i.e. Erf 6 Mossdustria (+/- 2.6 ha); and Remainder Portion 8 of Farm Rietvalley 225 (+/- 90 ha). Mrs. Wiles clarified that the extension project will include industrial development, an alternative energy production area, conservation area, business area and a motorsport arena. With the use of locality maps (see presentation attached), Mrs. Wiles described the proposed site layout. 3.2. Mr Naude expressed his concern over the ostrich loading area and indicated that Mrs Wiles should advise if this activity would trigger a Section 24G application. He also requested that the EAP should advise on what portions of land can be distinguished for specific activities. Mrs Wiles confirmed that every landowner/occupant will be responsible for specific activities within their property. She also explained that, for instance, within the alternative energy production area it is difficult to determine, what the triggers are at this early stage even and that the area is just earmarked for future use. 3.3. Mr Swanepoel enquired about the layout and viability of the conservation area and the alternative energy production area. Mr Naude also enquired about the size of the existing Mossdustria land being currently used and the size of the proposed expansion. Mr Manuel then expressed that he is unsure of the size of the current area but that the expansion area was estimated at 93 hectares.	GIBB	TBC

3.4. Mr Naude enquired as to what type of alternative energy is proposed and Mr Roux replied that there are proposals for solar or wind, which is dependent on the advice given for the most suitable option. Mr Naude then advised that solar infrastructure could be incorporated into the rooftop of the industrial areas if not suitable in the current proposed location. Mr Swanepoel then enquired if the solar energy infrastructure will be undertaken by MBM or tendered to a private company. Mr Roux then confirmed that MBM intends for a private company to undertake the work and MBM will then purchase from them directly for the municipal use. 3.5. Mr Roux highlighted that the alternative energy production area also falls within the PetroSA blast zone and this may present challenges and a risk towards the solar infrastructure. Mr. Swanepoel queried the known details of the blast zone, to which Mr. Roux responded that the blast zone has a radius of 2km. He also requested possible mitigation measures for working in blast zones. Mr. Swanepoel then enquired about the known impacts of the blast zone, more specifically the potential shockwaves and the known location of the epicenter. Additionally, Mr. Naude brought attention to the major hazardous regulations that would need to be considered. Mrs. Wiles indicated that PetroSA would have to be engaged to determine the risks and impacts surrounding the blast zone issue. Mr. Roux agreed that this information would need to be confirmed by their designated safety officer and disaster manager at PetroSA. Mr. Roux added that if the outcome determines a major risk by building on the demarcated blast zone land, then MBM will opt not to build on that land. 4. CONFIRMATION OF LISTED ACTIVITIES 4.1. Mrs Wiles indicated that she had not listed all the listed activities but the main one would be Listed Activity No.15 in Listing Notice 2, which would then require an Environmental Authorisation (EA) subject to a Scoping and Environmental Impact Reporting Process (S&EIR). She also mentioned that it would be easier to identify the other triggers once the specialists have undertaken site visits. 4.2. Mr Naude mentioned that other listed activities should be considered to create a framework for future use and highly recommended that the following activities should be considered: - Listing Notice 1 – Activities 3, 6, 9 and 10. - Listing Notice 2 - Activity 6. - Listing Notice 3 – Activity 10. Mrs Wiles indicated that she would review and include all potential listed activities.	GIBB	Upon submission of application

4.3. Mr Naude then mentioned the listed activities that could potentially be triggered upon closer inspection. These listed activities are as follows: - Listing Notice 1 – Activities 12, 19 and 28. - Listing Notice 2 - Activity 15. - Listing Notice 3 – Activities 4, 11 and 12. Mr Naude also indicated that depending on the size of the roads, this may then trigger Activity 22 in Listing Notice 1. Mrs Wiles added that Activity 21 in Listing Notice 1 could also be a possibility as well.		
4.4. Mr Roux then suggested that the EAP should apply for as many Listed Activities as possible, in order to become operational for economic developmental activities (excluding the application of AELs). Mr Naude then explained that the outcome would be the best case scenario as the listed activities would still have to be tested. As this would then provide the option of assessing the impacts associated with that specific activity in the designated area. Therefore, the results would then influence the general flow of development.	GIBB	Upon submission of application
4.5. Mrs Wiles expressed concern over the application of AELs, as the site is approximately 93 Ha and currently unsure of the potential triggers, especially considering that AELs are quite specific. Mr Naude then advised that the site should be assessed to identify if it is suitable for the type of industrial activities envisaged by determining the limits. However, it may be too complex to determine at this stage.		
5. SPECIALIST STUDIES		
5.1. Mrs Wiles pointed out that based on the outcomes of the Department of Environment, Forestry and Fisheries (DEFF) Screening Report, many Specialist Studies were identified and required clarity on the two separate reports generated due to the site falling within two different properties. Ms Swanepoel indicated that even though this is the case with the DEFF Screening Report, the specialist reports should be based on both properties in one report. Mr Naude advised that an overall summary of the findings in the two screening reports should be submitted as well. Mrs Wiles confirmed that the sensitivities and recommended specialist studies on both reports are the same.		
5.2. Mrs Wiles indicated that the terrestrial ecology report will cover both flora and fauna species assessments, even though the screening report has mentioned the assessments separately.		
5.3. Mrs Wiles also indicated that a site visit will determine which specialist studies will be undertaken and those that will be ruled out. She also enquired if a Visual Impact Assessment would be required considering the location of the development. Mr Naude indicated that a decision on what is deemed necessary could only be made once they have reviewed the Screening and site verification reports.

6. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PROCESS (PPP) 6.1. Mrs Wiles explained that as a minimum the PPP would involve the following: - Circulation of the Draft Scoping Report within the public domain for a period of 30 days. - Placing of a media advertisement in English in one local newspaper and placing site notice boards on site. - Submission of the Final Scoping Report to the WC DEADP for decision (43 days). - Circulation of the Draft Environmental Impact Report within the public domain for a period of 30 days. Submission of the Final Environmental Impact Report to the WC DEADP for decision (107 days). 6.2. Mr Naude indicated that although not a legal requirement, a pre-application phase is recommended as it would allow for inclusion of inputs from specialists, identification of major hazardous installations and identification of socio-economic issues, which will guide the needs, and desirability of the project. Mrs Wiles indicated she would further discuss this with the client. 6.3. Mrs Wiles enquired if an advert is published during the pre-application phase, if it would be necessary to re-advertise at a later stage. Mr Naude clarified that a media advert would not be required if published in the pre-application phase, it would be sufficient to re-erect site notices at the later stages of circulation too. However, it is only acceptable if the duration from the time the initial advert is published to, the time the Draft Scoping Report is made available to the public does not exceed a year. 6.4. Mr Naude also indicated that a Public Participation Plan should be submitted together with the Notice of Intent Form. Upon submission, it will be reviewed and they will then provide comments. 7. SUMMARY AND WAY FORWARD 7.1. Mrs Wiles reiterated that she would confirm the relevant triggers for the NOI stage. She also confirmed that she will confirm the necessary specialist studies and will submit a Public Participation Plan for decision. 7.2. Mr Naude emphasised that they will finalise their comments in response to the Notice of Intent Form. He advised that a motivation for excluding certain specialist studies should accompany the site verification report and screening report for their final approval. 8. MEETING CLOSURE 8.1. With no further matters arising, Mrs Wiles expressed her gratitude to the members of WCDEADP and MBM for their time and for attending. 8.2. The meeting concluded at 10h40.

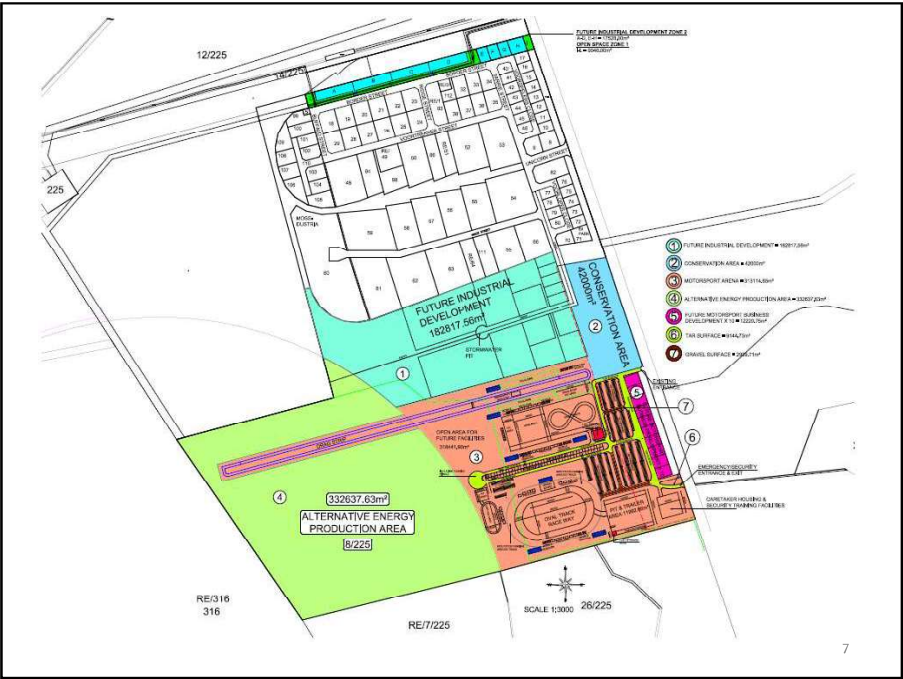

Based on our understanding of the site sensitivities, GIBB is of the opinion that it may be possible to compile an Initial Site Sensitivity Verification Report for certain studies, and on the basis of this motivate that there is no requirement to undertake all of the above-listed specialist assessments for the Mossdustria site.

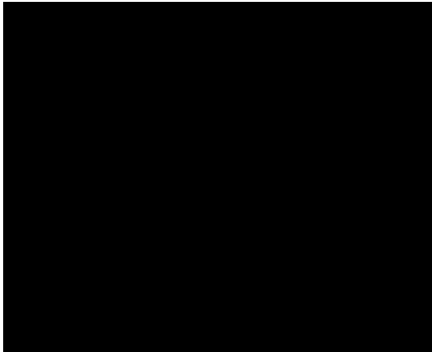

1. WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION 1.1. Ms Kate Flood (KF) explained that this is the second pre-application meeting for the project. The meeting is being undertaken due to a change in project team. Ms Kate Flood (KF) welcomed the attendees and requested attendees introduce themselves. KF presented the agenda of the meeting. KF listed the previous engagements with DEADP on the project.

6.2 FN requested that the development of an industrial area versus a raceway should be considered as an alternative.	GIBB	
6.3 FN queried if a layout alternative had been considered, with development of the raceway occurring in the disturbed area in the western portion of the site. FN further noted that this may be possible if that portion of the site is located in the exclusion zone (blast radius) of PetroSA.		
6.4 KF explained that it is not possible to have the raceway on the western side of the site due to the PetroSA blast zone.		
6.5 FN noted that it appears that development (buildings and transformation) had occurred in the north of portion 8 of erf 225. An explanation of this development would need to be included in the report to avoid any S24G issues.	GIBB	
6.6 JC suggested that a land use alternative could be the develop the site in its entirety including the area demarcated for conservation. The alternative would be development of this areas versus conservation.		
6.7 FN noted that GIBB would need to determine whether an offset is needed, how it would be managed and whether an offset is practical.	GIBB	
6.8 JR requested clarity from FN on whether the establishment of ostrich camps, would be considered as clearance of vegetation. JR noted that the land is zoned for agriculture.		
6.9 FN indicated that if trampling by ostriches had resulted in removal of vegetation then it would be considered as clearance.		
6.10 JR queried that if the portion of land had been cultivated in the past 10 years, would the clearance be considered as lawful.		
6.11 FN indicated it would need to be looked into, along with any permits which may have been issued for clearance.		
7. LISTED ACTIVITIES		
7.1. KF stated that the following list of triggered listed activities would need to be revised. This is based on earlier discussions which indicated the site is not located in an urban area according to the EIA Regulation definition.	GIBB	
7.2. FN and JC agreed that the site is located outside an urban area, and this will have implications for the listed activities applied for.		
7.3. KF queried whether the municipality is responsible for defining the urban edge.		
7.4. FN confirmed that this is correct, however the Competent Authority needs to adopt the urban edge as defined in a Spatial Development Framework, and because this had not yet been done, DEADP does not recognise any urban edge for the municipality.

7.5 KF confirmed that the listed of listed activities would be updated.

8.1. KF requested clarity on whether a public participation plan was needed, considering that the State of Disaster had officially ended.

8.3. JC confirmed that a public participation plan had been submitted to DEADP and approved.		
8.4. KF noted that any changes to the public participation plan would be submitted to DEADP for approval.	GIBB	
8.5. JC queried if any pre-application public participation was planned.		
8.6. KF indicated that pre-application public participation on the draft scoping report had not been planned but could be undertaken if DEADP believe it would add value to the project.		
8.7. JC also indicated that the water-use license application should also be covered during the public participation process.	GIBB	
8.8. KF queried if DEADP felt a public meeting and virtual stakeholder meeting would be beneficial.		
8.9. FN deferred the question on public meetings to JR and noted that a virtual meeting with stakeholders would be beneficial in obtaining comments.		
8.10. JR stated that based on recent experience, the attendance at public meetings depended on the areas where meetings are held. However, Mossel Bay would support a public meeting to try and obtain comments on the proposed development.	GIBB

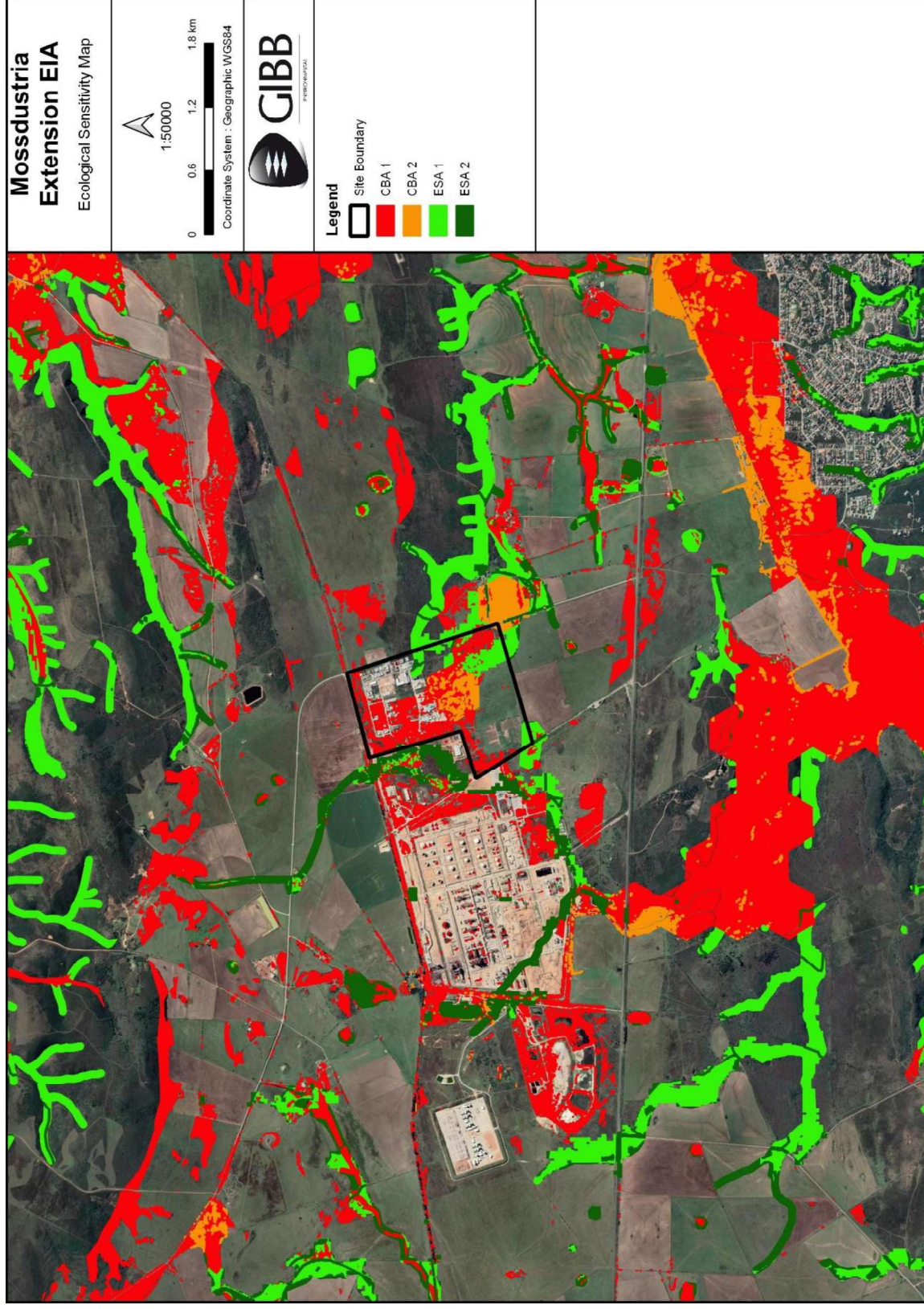

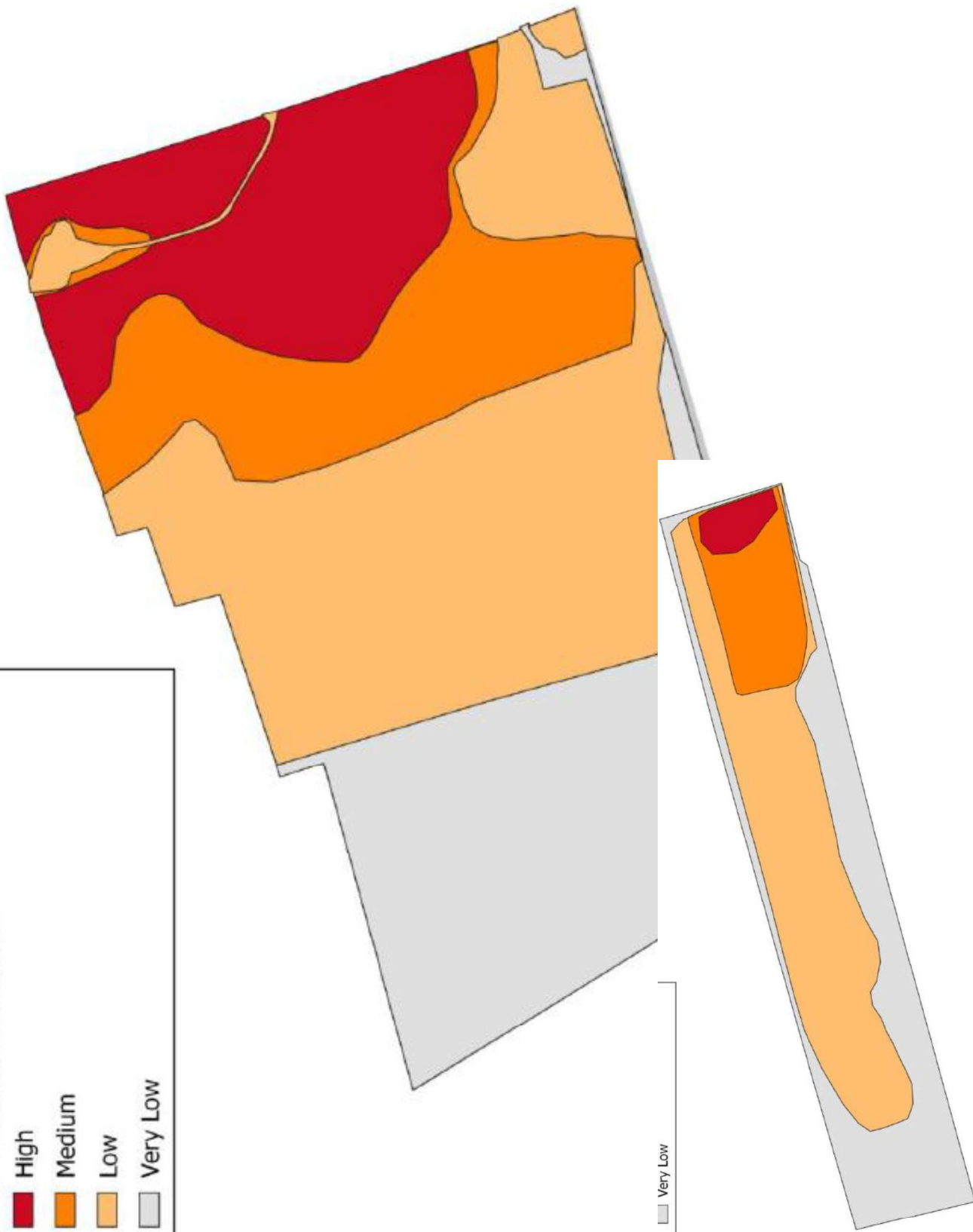
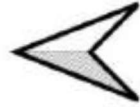
