EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Site Name

Proposed extension of Mossdustria and the establishment of a raceway on the Remainder of Rietvalley 225/8, Mossel Bay.

Location

The subject area (87.7ha in extent) is situated 13km to the west of Mossel Bay, 27km southeast of the rural village of Herbertsdale, and directly adjoining the existing Mossdustria industrial area. It is directly east of the PetroSA and the Gourikwa Power Plants.

The centre of the study area is located at: S 34°10'2.22"S; E 22° 0'18.15"E

Description of Proposed Development

- Development of the Remainder of the farm Riet Valley 225/8 to make provision for the following:
 - Future industrial expansion of covering an area of 13ha;
 - Conservation area (15ha) covering the environmentally sensitive wetland area along the eastern property boundary;
 - Motorsport arena incorporating e.g. an oval race track, drag strip, drifting track, fuel storage, go cart track, workshops, spectator pavilions, training, ablution and emergency facilities, parking as well as ancillary services and infrastructure (38ha);
 - Motorsport business development units (10) (included in the 38ha for the motorsport arena) ;
 - Alternative energy generation area (22ha).

Background to the Walk over Report

S de Kock of Perception Planning submitted a Notification of Intent to Develop (NID) to Heritage Western Cape (HWC) in July 2022. It was discussed at HWC Heritage Officers Meeting (HOMS) on the

18 July 2022, and it was noted that although the area appeared badly degraded, concern was expressed about the possibility of impacts to archaeology. The Case Officer (S. Barnardt) suggested the following two (2) possibilities:

a) Option One - An archaeological walk-over of the site and submission of a report regarding potential archaeological sensitivities. Should there be significant archaeological resources, HWC will allow that to be dealt with as part of a permitting process in terms of Section 35 of the National Heritage Resources Act (Act 25 of 1999) NHRA.

b) Option 2 - HWC requests a Heritage Impact Assessment(HIA) focussing on archaeology. This will then require public participation etc.

S de Kock advised HWC that the client, Mossel Bay Municipality, intended to follow Option 1.

Archaeological Resources Identified

Webley conducted an archaeological walk over on 14 and 16 March 2023. The following was recorded:

- A very sparse scatter of Early Stone Age (ESA) stone tools (on yellow quartzite cobbles) spread across the southern extent of the property. This mirrors the same quartzite stone tools observed in recently ploughed farmlands on the adjoining property. They are considered Not Conservation Worthy (NCW).
- Large blocks of stone which are heaped in the central and northern extent of the property, and which appear to represent old farming activities (i.e. stones which have been removed to clear lands and have been heaped in the central area). They are NCW.

Anticipated Impacts on Archaeological Resources

The very sparse ESA stone tool scatter (less than 10 artefacts were recorded) will be disturbed during the development for the raceway. However, they are probably in secondary context because they are in old, ploughed lands. The impacts are considered to be very Low.

Recommendations

The site has very low sensitivity. An HIA is not required. No mitigation measures are proposed, and the development is supported.

The standard clause applies:

If during ground clearance or construction, any archaeological material or human graves are uncovered, work in that area should be stopped immediately and the Environmental Control Officer (ECO) must report this to Heritage Western Cape. The heritage resource may require inspection by the heritage authorities, and it may require further mitigation in the form of excavation and curation in an approved institution.

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1. INTRODUCTION

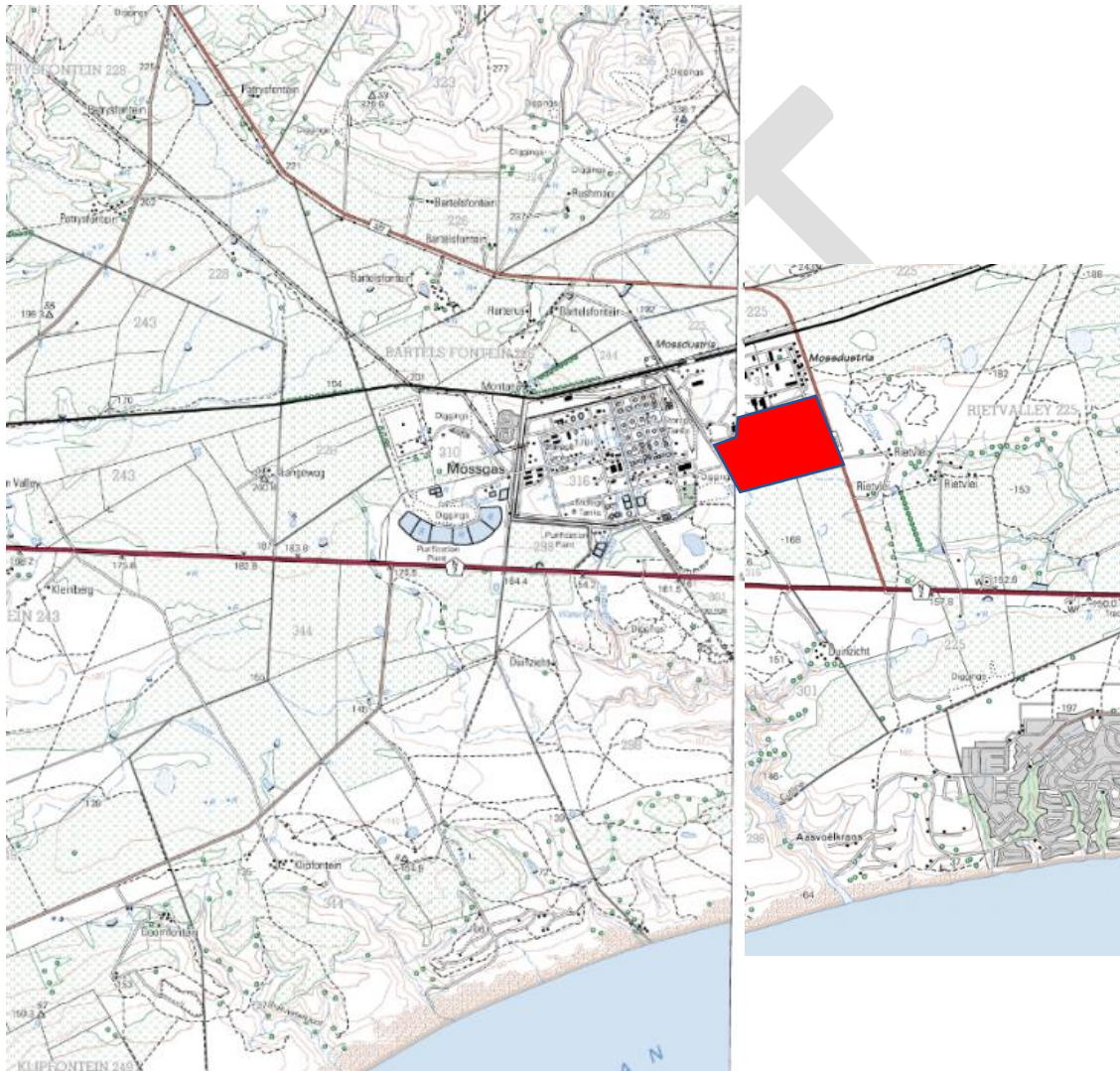


Figure 1: Extracts from 1:50 000 map sheets 3421BB and 3422AA (Mossel Bay) indicating the location of the study area adjoining Mossdustria, PetroSA and the Gourikwa Power Station (Source of Map: Chief Directorate: National Geo-Spatial Information. Website: www.ngi.gov.za).

Lita Webley was appointed by Gibb Environmental, on behalf of the client, Mossel Bay Municipality, to compile an archaeological walk over report to submit to Heritage Western Cape (HWC) for the proposed extension of Mossdustria and the establishment of a raceway on the remainder of the farm Rietvalley 225/8, Mossel Bay. The study area is 13km west of Mossel Bay, adjoins the Mossdustria facility and adjoins PetroSA and the Gourikwa Power Plant (Figures 1 & 2).

The centre of the study area is located at: S34.165252°; E 22.005764°

The subject area (87.7ha in extent) is situated 13km to the west of Mossel Bay, 27km southeast of the rural village of Herbertsdale, and directly adjoining the existing Mossdustria industrial area. It is directly east of the PetroSA and the Gourikwa Power Plant (Fig 2). The study area consists of one cadastral land unit, namely the remainder of the farm Rietvalley 225/8 (situated directly south of Mossdustria industrial area). There is vehicular access from the R327 off the N2 National Road.

Existing land use in the surrounds of the study area includes agricultural lands to the north and east with the Mossdustria industrial area within the centre of the study area. The historic Rietvalley farmstead (now Reed Valley Wines), is 500m to the east of the study area boundary.

2. PROJECT PROPOSAL

According to the information made available by Gibb Environmental (Pty) Ltd, the proposed development would entail the following:

- Development of the Remainder of the farm Riet Valley 225/8 to make provision for the following:
 - Future industrial expansion of Mossdustria comprising covering an area of 13ha;
 - Conservation area (15ha) covering the environmentally sensitive wetland area along the eastern property boundary;
 - Motorsport arena incorporating e.g. an oval race track, drag strip, drifting track, fuel storage, go cart track, workshops, spectator pavilions, training, ablution and emergency facilities, parking as well as ancillary services and infrastructure (38ha);
 - Motorsport business development units (10) (included in the 38ha for the motorsport arena);
 - Alternative energy generation area (22ha).

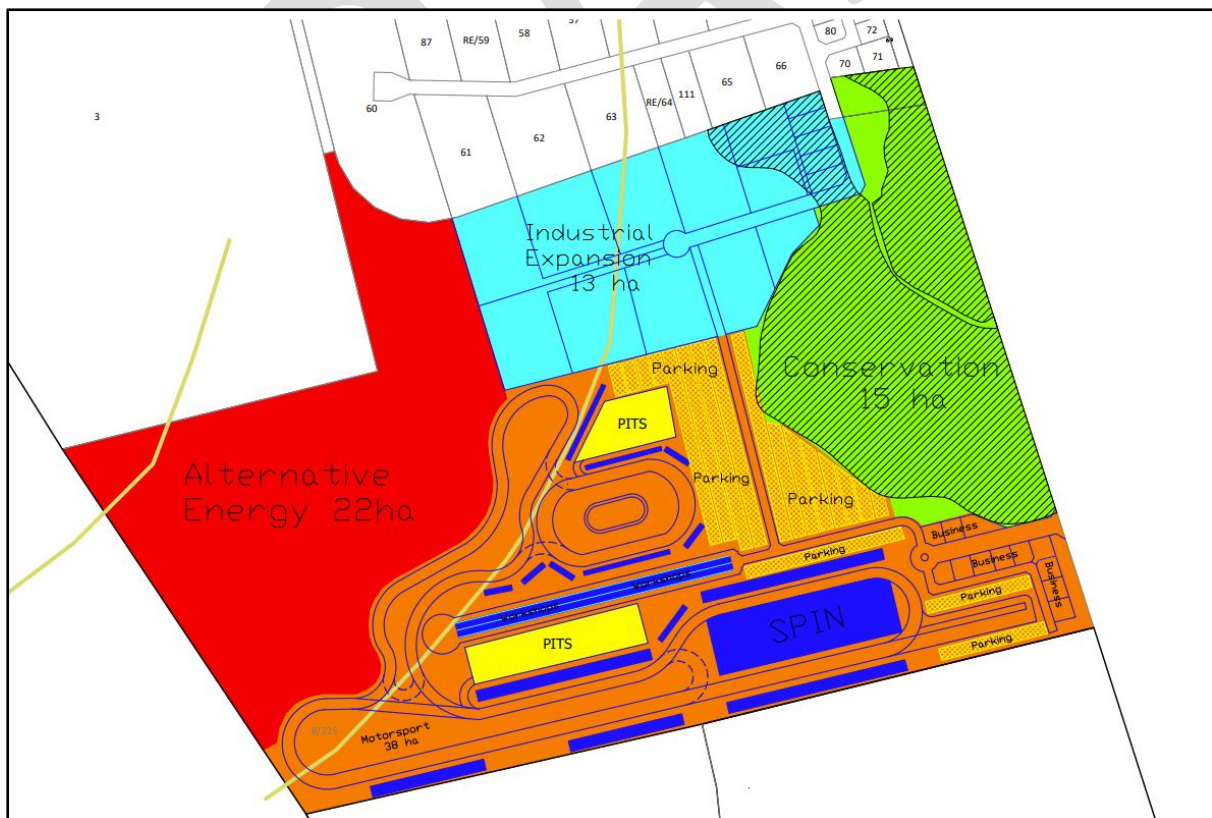


Figure 4: Preliminary site layout plan

4. HERITAGE LEGISLATION

While the Department of Environmental Affairs and Development Planning (DEA&DP) is the decision making authority acting in terms of the National Environmental Management Act (Act 107 of 1998) (NEMA) and Regulations (2014), they must ensure that the evaluation of the statutorily defined broad range of heritage resources fulfils the requirements of the relevant heritage resources authority in terms of Section 38 (8) of the National Heritage Resources Act (Act 25 of 1999) (NHRA) and that any comments and recommendations of the relevant heritage resources authority with regard to proposed development have been taken into account prior to the granting of the consent.

The NHRA provides protection for the following categories of heritage resources:

- Landscapes, cultural or natural (Section 3 (3))
- Buildings or structures older than 60 years (Section 34);
- Archaeological Sites, palaeontological material and meteorites (Section 35);

- Burial grounds and graves (Section 36);
- Public monuments and memorials (Section 37);
- Living heritage (defined in the Act as including cultural tradition, oral history, performance, ritual, popular memory, skills and techniques, indigenous knowledge systems and the holistic approach to nature, society and social relationships) (Section 2 (d) (xxi)).

This report is conducted in terms of Section 38 (8) of the National Heritage Resources Act, No 25 of 1999.

4.1 Grading

Heritage resources are graded following the grading guidelines, “Grading: Purpose and Management Implications” as approved by Heritage Western Cape in 2016.

A survey of available literature was carried out to assess the archaeological heritage of the area. The information sources are provided in Table 2 below.

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5.1 Field Survey

A field survey was undertaken on the 14 and 16 March 2023. The position of identified archaeological resources was plotted using a handheld GPS unit set on the map datum WGS84. A track of the paths was captured, and digital images were taken of the area and archaeological resources. The survey was conducted in autumn; however the season of the survey is not anticipated to impact on the visibility of archaeological resources and the author has a **high degree of confidence in the results of the field survey**. The tracks are indicated in Figure 4.

5.2 Limitations

Since HIA reports from the Western Cape Province that are more recent than 2009, are not on the SAHRIS database, the literature on archaeological resources in the general vicinity of the study area is out of date. While it is possible that there is Cultural Resource Management CRM literature more recent than 2009, it is not readily available to heritage practitioners.

6. RECEIVING ENVIRONMENT

The remainder of Rietvalley 225/8 is overgrown by a mix of low-growing indigenous grasses and shrubs interspersed with alien invasive shrubs and trees. Dumping of refuse, building rubble but also animal carcasses were noted across the property. Evidence of former agricultural practices in the form of heaps of rock from cleared lands, an old reservoir and an animal drinking trough were observed.



Plates 1 & 2: Left the remnants of old ostrich structures, right the low bushes and grasses which characterise the southern portion of the property.

The western portion of the study area was an ostrich quarantine facility until at least 2022. The area comprises a number of large camps and it is highly disturbed and degraded. This area is currently leased to a farmer who keeps horses on the land.

7. REVIEW OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL CONTEXT

The study area is 5km north of Dana Bay and 8km north-west of Pinnacle Point. The latter site (Graded 1 and of World Heritage significance) is known for its Middle Stone Age sequence, but Nilssen (2005) in his report on archaeological monitoring of the site, observed rare ESA occurrences as well.

In his report on the transmission lines between the Proteus substation and the OCGT power station (Gourikwa) at Mossel Bay, Hart (2006) noted scatters of ESA material on farmlands along the route of the proposed power lines. Nilssen & Yates (pers comm) also monitored the earthmoving operations for the OCGT site and recovered a number of ESA artefacts from the surface. According to their observations, there was no further archaeological material below the surface.

Kaplan (2007) discovered a low-density scatter of LSA, MSA and a few ESA tools thinly spread across the landscape in the Dana Bay area. More recently, a survey by Kaplan (2021) to the south of the study area (and the N2 National Road) recorded MSA artefacts in the gravel road and in the mine footprint but they were graded as having Low (IIC) significance. In his survey for the Mossel Bay Wind Farm, Nilssen (2012) recorded fifteen scatters of ESA, MSA and LSA stone tools in both undisturbed and ploughed contexts.

Hart concluded in his heritage assessment of 2005 that *“Since the study area lies in rolling open landscape away from the coast, the expectation is that the kind of archaeological material that will be found will consist of open scatters of Early and Middle Stone Age artifacts (with the rarer concentrations of later material). Since there are no rocky outcrops, shelters or natural foci in the study area, occurrences of Late Stone Age material are not expected to be frequent”*.

8. RESULTS OF THE SURVEY

The field survey confirms the expectations raised by Hart (2005), i.e. that there could be disbursed scatters of ESA material in old lands. The ploughed lands immediately to the south of the study area (see Plates 5 & 6 below) contain large numbers of quartzite cobbles. A very small percentage (i.e. less than 10 artefacts observed) are flaked. This disbursed scatter extends into the study area, and is visible in the south. However, dense vegetation makes it difficult to identify and record any scatters further to the centre and north of the property. The geology of the area, suggests that the quartzite cobbles occur only in the south. A few of stone tools were recorded and they are illustrated in Plates 7 & 8 and 10 below. They will have been subjected to ploughing activities over the last 50 years and are no longer in primary context. They are considered Low significance.

9. IMPACTS TO ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESOURCES

The main cause of impacts to archaeological sites is direct, physical disturbance of the material itself and its context. The heritage and scientific potential of an archaeological site is highly dependent on its geological and spatial context. This means that even though, for example a deep excavation may expose buried archaeological sites and artefacts, the artefacts are relatively meaningless once removed from the area in which they were found. The impacts are likely to be most severe during the construction period although indirect impacts may occur during the operational phase of the project.

It is important to note that archaeological sites and unmarked graves may be buried beneath the surface and may only be exposed during earth-moving and construction.

It is the considered opinion of this walkdown report, that the archaeological impacts of the proposed development on the archaeological resources of the site, will be Low.

10. SITE SENSITIVITY VERIFICATION

A screening tool report for the proposed Mossdustria development was drawn from the Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) screening tool in February 2023. The screening report identifies the site as **low** sensitivity for the archaeological and cultural heritage theme. The walk over confirms this rating.
